I attended and through personal observation gained an understanding of the evolution of the various German Club Policy directives and objectives. Also extremely important is to understand the relevance of German Club Bylaws when exported to foreign legal jurisdictions. The quick answer to that is the law applicable where these systems are being practiced is indeed in the legal jurisdiction of the country in which it is being practiced. For example in our case the United States of America and or Canada.

Therefore, any attempt to have the DVK sanction or punish anyone in either the jurisdictions of the U.S. or Canada will be subject to the natural law of one or the other. German Law has no relevance in either coun-

try. Therefore, doing anything that could lead to conflict subject to adjudication in the courts is an unacceptable exposure and speaking solely for myself is an unacceptable risk to me. It is also my opinion that each of you consider carefully your own risk tolerance before making any demands to attempt to impose our views on others. The DKV had such an exposure in Germany and we all know the results of that.

The Future: We have had in most instances a good year. Great tests, good participation and for the most part enjoyment and satisfaction. This has to be nurtured and expanded.

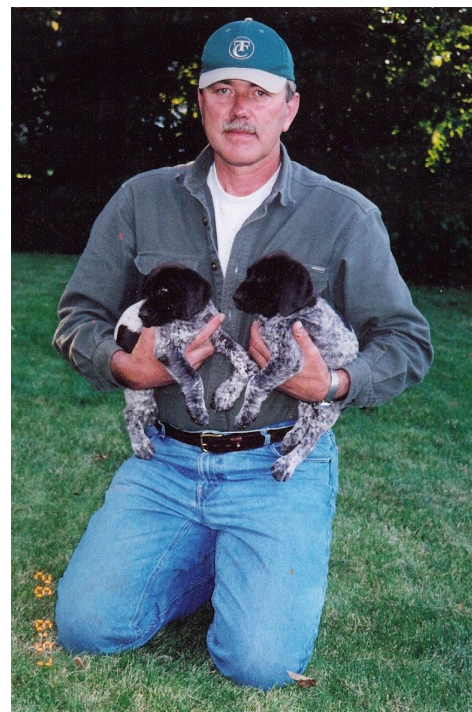
From the Vice President/Director of Testing

Greetings to everyone from cold and snowy Minnesota. In recent years we have been blessed with a string of mild winters, but this winter is not one of them. It has been very cold, snowy, and windy. There were 20 days with morning temperatures below zero. A significant freezing rain storm hit the area the first part of January which wrecked havoc with our pheasant population. Freezing rain is the pheasant's worst enemy. As rain turns to ice it tends to freeze on the pheasants beak resulting in suffocation. The good news is that with the rain and snow our wetlands should recharge for the return of waterfowl this spring.

Congratulations and welcome to both of our newly appointed Board members, Gary Fleming is our Southeast Region Director, and Mario Polsinelli is our Director at large. Thank you for accepting your new positions, your commitment and dedication to the DK and the VCDKK are very much appreciated. In addition I would like to thank Gabe (L) LaSalla for taking on the task of our clubs Breed Warden. Gabe is a student of the DK breed and I am confident that he will fulfill the responsibilities of Breed Warden with ease.

The 24th Internationale Kurzhaar- Prufung "IKP" will be hosted by the Klub Kurzhaar Schieswig-Holstein on October 15-18 in the Nordfriesland area of Germany. Minimum qualifications to enter the IKP include: 1) received at least two prize 1 scores during a Derby, Solms, AZP or VGP. (Note: Derby alone is not sufficient, Derby plus Solms, AZP, HZP or VGP) The Solms test can be substituted with an HZP as long as it is documented that all HZP scores are in the VG category (9 to 11 points). 2) Received a conformation rating of at least SG (Very Good). You will find the test regulations for the IKP on our website in the members section under forms and documents. The deadline to enter the IKP is July 15th. Feel free to contact me if you are interested in entering the IKP, entries must be submitted through the club.

The Deutsch Kurzhaar Verband made some changes to the DK testing regulations in 2008. The Zuchtshau regulations were amended to say that "The adult dog class is open for dogs over 15 months of age". Previously the adult class included only dogs over 18 months of age. Also in early fall we received notice from DKV that an English translation of the March 17, 2007 Solms/AZP rules had been completed and must be implemented immediately. The primary changes to the Solms/AZP rules included that the furred game drag length is now 350 meters. In the past the length of the furred game drag was 500 meters. The other significant change is in the area of manner of retrieve. The new rules indicate that the dog must independently retrieve the game without the handler influencing or correcting the dogs mistakes. An English translation of the March 17, 2007 Solms/AZP regulations is available on the DKV website in the test regulations section. Feel free to contact me if you have any questions about the testing regulations.

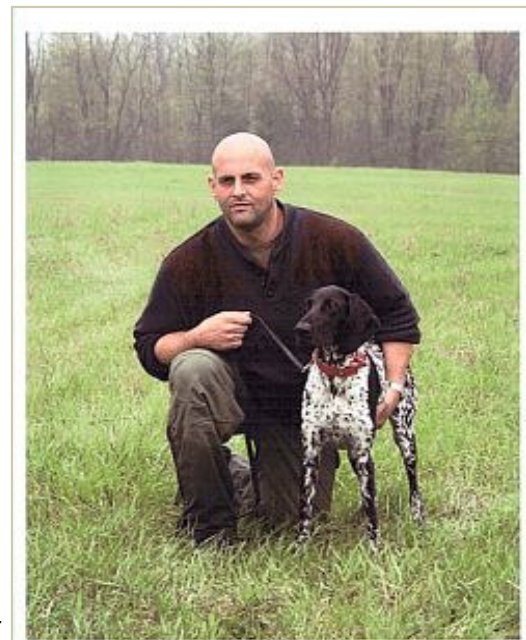
From the Treasurer

Chukar Challenge

On Saturday February 7th, 2009 I entered my Deutsch Kurzhaar, Clo vom Holtvogt, in our very first Chukar Challenge.

The Chukar Challenge rules allow one dog and two shooters. The officials put six birds into the field then you and your dog have thirty minutes to find the birds.

Each handler has six shells. There were 23 dogs of all different types entered in the Challenge. They included several types of pointing dogs and one pointing Lab.

There were two running fields and my dog and I were picked to run 4th in field two. After the brace was over our team had six birds and six shells left. We had taken a total of fourteen minutes to find all the birds.

That put us in first place.

As the day went on, the dog that was picked 17th to run in field one tied our score.

The day closed with a tie and the closest time to us and the team we were tied with was sixteen minutes. Both with six birds and six shots. We had to decide how to break the tie. My decision was to let the dogs out for ten minutes with only the stray birds left in the field that the other dogs hadn't found. The first dog to go on point wins.

The other competitor didn't like that idea so we finally decided to let a coin toss decide our fate. I picked heads and it came up tails so I ended up with second place.

Bob was the first place winner. Bob was the guy who had hosted the Chukar Challenge at his gun club.

This was the first Chukar Challenge that I have ever run in and I was proud of the way my Deutsch Kurzhaar performed in surroundings where he had never encountered birds before. It was a great day for both of us!

Calming Your Dog During Thunder Storms**by: Gary Fleming**

We had another huge thunder storm here in Tallahassee, Florida yesterday evening and to use a little southern terminology it was a “humdinger”. Many folks know that Florida is the lightning capital of the world with more annual lightning strikes than any other place on earth. There are lots of reasons for that but that science may be a really dry topic and not the cusp of what I want to share with you here.

What I want to tell you is how I use lightning to my advantage when training dogs, especially puppies. I’ve lived in Florida all of my life and I can still remember my first dog running and hiding in fear every time a good thunder storm would start to come up. One day I even found the pup with its head stuck in an empty waste paper basket. I’m not sure if the pup was trying to muffle the sound of the thunder or just hide from it but he was obviously scared to death.

The next dog I had simply paced back and forth nervously when she heard the dull rumbling of an eminent storm brewing up. She became more and more distraught as the wind picked up and even more so when the rain started. She was simply terrified of storms and had no idea what to do about it. She seemed to be able to here the muffled rumbles of an approaching storm long before I could.

When I purchased my first Kurzhaar pup several years ago it seemed to awaken some hidden intelligence in me and indemnify me from all things Drahthaar. And due to that renaissance I became more aware of my surroundings and how to use them to my training advantage.

As it were, one day while sitting with my new puppy, a thunder boomer started moving in. As the dull rumbling moved closer I thought about what I should do with the pup to prevent it from becoming petrified of the storm.

We obviously can’t run and hide every time a lightning storm comes up and I can’t be home to comfort the pup during thunder storms 24/7. After a minute of pontification (only a minute is required of Kurzhaar owners) I decided that the best approach is to be calm myself. Lightning and thunder aren’t my favorite things either but I forced myself to be calm or at least appear so to the dog.

My next decision turned out to be a smart one. I got the bag of treats out and every time thunder erupted I praised the pup and gave it a treat. It seemed to work and before you know it the pup was more comfortable with the loud claps of thunder than I was!

Extrapolating a little one might infer that this sort of conditioning could help when it comes to preventing gun sensitivity. Though that may be a bit of a stretch it’s all good. At any rate it’s a good idea to try this before your dog develops a fear of lightning and storms.

Living in Florida makes this kind of attempt at calming your dog during storms a necessity since the thunder storms are inevitable part of life and generally occur each afternoon in the rainy season. You simply can’t escape the crisp explosions of thunder even when you’re inside of your home.

Some dogs stay outside in the kennel thus may have no choice but to endure the deafening blasts during the every day thunder storms. If you can make it easier on your dog by calming them and making the storm events somewhat pleasurable to them when they are young, it may save you both a lot of future anxiety.


